Celebrate Rotary's Centennial by Honoring Paul Harris

Rotary founder Paul Harris is among more than 70 outstanding U.S. volunteers who will be honored through a new national memorial in Washington, D.C., located on a one-mile path adjacent to the White House and U.S. Treasury Department.

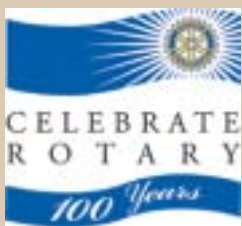
When completed, "The Extra Mile" Volunteer Pathway will feature bronze medallions with a likeness of each honoree, a description of achievements, and/or a quotation. Medallions will measure 42 inches (more than 1 meter) in diameter. Dedication is planned for mid-2005.

The RI Board of Directors has approved this project to facilitate the construction of the Paul Harris medallion, which will be placed in a block of granite set into the sidewalk. An effort is under way to raise US\$50,000 toward the cost of the monument. Contributions of \$250 or more will receive a 3-inch bronze replica medallion keepsake.

"More than 1.7 million visitors are expected to see the Pathway each year and the medallion will remain there in perpetuity, creating a wonderful public relations opportunity for Rotary International, according to RI Vice President Frank C. Collin Jr. '03-'04 and Past District Governor Jack B. Blane, co-chairs of the project, in a letter addressed to all U.S. District Governors, RI General Officers, and The Rotary Foundation Trustees.

The Points of Light Foundation, initiator of the program, believes that the memorial will help promote the spirit of volunteerism among visitors who walk along the pathway.

Thanks PDG Rudy!

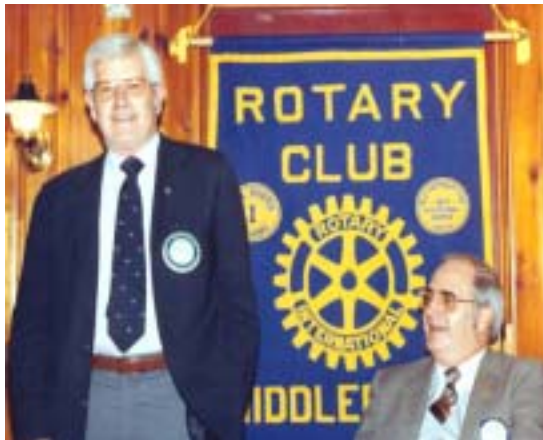
To most of us it is impossible to imagine a meeting of the Middleburgh Rotary Club without Rudy Snyder sitting with us and giving that bit of advise that solves the problem or settles the discussion. Each of us has a story of how Rudy helped us or steered us back on the right track. None of us can recall him telling us exactly what we had to do but we felt Rudy's presence with what we often thought was our idea only to later recall that we may have been asked to consider that path to follow.

The 86 years of Rudy's life were filled with adventure and experiences if which many of us only dream.. The country boy from Middleburgh and Potter Hollow served as a pilot in World War II, flying transport planes in the Burma area. We had the opportunity of hearing some of his stories about flying the "Goonie Birds" and C-46s in that area. His humor and candor about those times masked the fact that the duty was hazardous and his service was courageous.

Returning home to Middleburgh Rudy went into business, first as a partner in the building supply business and subsequently as a land surveyor. He was active in so many areas of the community that this page does not have enough room to list them. Rudy was Mayor of the Village of Middleburgh, a lifelong leader in the Boy Scouts (He was the first Eagle Scout in Troop 2.), served on the Boards of Directors of the Schoharie County Community Hospital and the Middleburgh Telephone Company just to name a few. He was an active member of his church, the American Legion, the Masonic Lodge and the Middleburgh Fire Department and many other service and fraternal organizations.

Janet, Jody, Meg, Betsy and Jim were always at the center of Rudy's life. And then the grandchildren came and with them more sunshine. Rotary's Member-Son and Member-Daughter Nights became memorable occasions with his guests numbering 5 to 8.

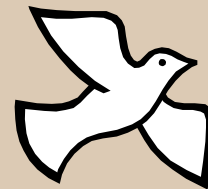
Rudy was a Rotarian for nearly 50 years and had a record of perfect attendance for more than 42 years. His attendance was commendable but the more important fact was that he participated in each meeting. Not necessarily as a leader but as a Rotarian. We knew that he was there and that we could rely on his experience and his wisdom to guide us through difficulties and good times. When pancakes needed to be baked, when dishes needed to be washed, when furniture for an auction needed to be moved, when ice cream needed to be scooped and when the site of the fund raiser or event needed to be cleaned up, he was there. Rudy served as District Governor of what was District 719 in 1983-1984. He was a true example of quiet leadership. Rudy attended to the needs of the clubs in our district and carried the message of the



International President without fanfare. The district conference at the Otesaga was a great success, a perfect blend of fun and Rotary business. Observers were often amazed that the tasks were accomplished with such ease and success without furor. Rudy Snyder continued to be an active Rotarian after his service as Governor and brought to our club a knowledge and understanding of the principles of Rotary which provided an invaluable resource to our membership. Although not one to give lengthy speeches, he gained the respect of our membership. I recall one time that a member had written out in some detail a procedure to install the new officers of the club and asked Rudy to do the task. His first act was to toss the script aside. He then proceeded to install the officers with a brief talk explaining their duties and the responsibility of each office. His calm tone and true sincerity accomplished the task with far more decorum and dignity than would have been provided by the printed script. Rudy understood the meaning of "Service Above Self" and he was a true example of that motto.

We all recall one of the times when Rudy was asked to give the invocation. He stood at the table, bowed his head and said, "Thanks."

I believe that I can speak for my fellow Rotarians when I say to Rudy, **THANKS.**

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Foundation Scholarship Chair, George Frost, Reports

This is a brief report from George Frost regarding the District's attendance at MAST this summer in Valley Forge, PA. George attended along with our scholars Geoffrey Gresh and Megan Neumeister. I brought Megan with me and Geoffrey got there on his own.

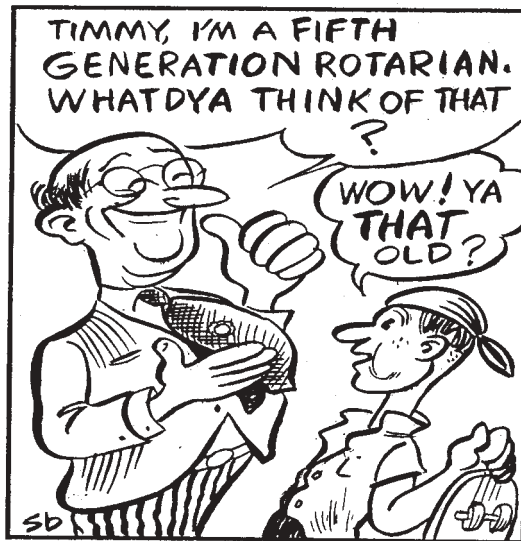
The event was highly successful and our scholars received a lot of important information on what to expect and how to handle themselves abroad. We were favorably impressed with the program content and the staff. The venue was absolutely great. There was a very capable staff and about six alumni who presented the material. We were advised that a multi-district venue is now mandated unless there are extenuating circumstances. Zone 32 conducts two events, one for inbound and one for outbound scholars. They get some financial help from The Rotary Foundation (TRF).

There were 33 outbound scholars present from as far away as Texas, California, Wisconsin and British Columbia. Over half were local and three were from Zone 31. There were nine counselors.

Having done a one on one orientation with our peace scholar and now with the experience of a multi-district program, George is convinced we should use a multi-district venue. The cross pollination of scholars and alumni and the ability to bring together a faculty of experts in the various areas of concern make a fulfilling event. Mandating a multi-district event will be a challenge to TRF to set up venues around the world and find a way to help fund them. Finding counselors who will do a credible job may be a district challenge. Ambassadorial, Peace and Cultural Scholars as well as University Teachers must participate in an orientation program to get their money and be approved to participate in their scholarship or grant.

At the present time we do not have any candidates for either the World Peace Scholarship or the University Teacher Grant. We've turned away about six potential ambassadorial candidates.

If the district opts to use some District Designated Funds (DDF) for Educational Programs, Peace Scholar applicants will show up each year and we will get our usual contingent of inbound scholars. This means we will have to deal with the orientation issue.

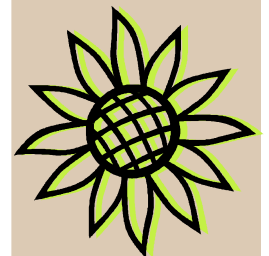

PAUL AND JEAN HARRIS HOME FOUNDATION

There has been a group of Illinois, Indiana and Michigan Past District Governors that have been working with past and current RI directors over the last five years to acquire the Paul Harris house located in Morgan Park which is a neighborhood on the south side of the Chicago. Rotary International does not wish to acquire the founder's house.

Rotary International has however allowed us the use of the name "Paul and Jean Harris' Home Foundation" for a non profit foundation, with the expressed mission of acquiring the house and operating it as a museum at no cost to Rotary International.

This group of PDG's has formed a not for profit foundation (The Paul and Jean Harris' Home Foundation) which needs the help of every Rotary District, Club and individual Rotarian to have the house available for the 2005 Centennial Convention in Chicago, the birth place of Rotary. Paul and Jean moved into the house in 1912. The house was selected because it was very near to the location that Paul met Jean in 1910 with a hiking group.

With your help and the clubs in your district we can acquire the house and preserve it as a museum. The house would be open by arrangement to any Rotarian or club to visit and to have their very special meeting in the house. There are many other planned Rotarian uses for the house including being a depository of the Rotary Presidents personal correspondence.

We have been given an option to purchase the house for \$550,000, which was appraised by a non Rotarian appraiser at a current fair market price of \$561,687. The offer to buy for \$550,000 has been accepted and a non refundable deposit of \$1,000 was given. That option expires on September 1, 2004. The sales agreement requires at least 5% of the full purchase price on September 1, 2004 with the balance at closing but no later than December 31, 2004.

We would very much like to have your views and hope your support for this Historical Rotary Centennial Project.

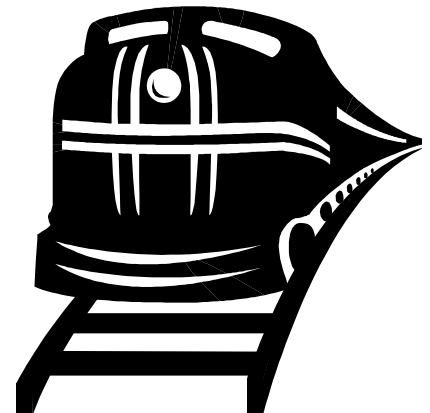
