Scholarships

Educational grants to further Rotary's mission to promote world understanding and peace. Gifted future leaders serve as ambassadors of goodwill while studying.

- **Recruit**—candidates for:
 - (1) **Ambassadorial Scholarships**—Academic (1 yr.), Cultural (3 or 6 mo.)
 - (2) **Rotary World Peace Fellowships**—2 year masters program in peace & conflict resolution at 1 of 7 worldwide Rotary Centers for International Studies
 - (3) **University Teachers**—experienced teachers to serve in a developing country
- **Provide hospitality for visiting Scholars**—offer a friendly break from campus life for an outstanding international Rotary Scholar
- **Alumni**—identify former Ambassadorial Scholars in your club or community

Local Projects

- **Identify**—a short term charitable, educational or humanitarian project that benefits a community within our district.
- **Funding assistance**—can be provided by **District Simplified Grants**

International Projects

- **Identify**—a charitable, educational or humanitarian project with an international partner for the benefit of a community in a foreign country, or in our own country!
- **Partner**—with a Rotary district/club in the target community
- **Funding assistance**—can be provided by:
 - District Simplified Grants**—amount available varies annually
 - Matching Grants**—minimum grant of \$5,000 for 2005-2006
 - 3-H Grants** (Health, Hunger & Humanity)—for large projects that alleviate hunger, improve health, & enhance human & social development
